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Picking and Training the Show Puppy

Answers to my questions from well known, respected breeders

My training starts with picking of a puppy, of course I look for Body, bone, head, shoulders and the rest of the things I want in a puppy, then I look at attitude and confidence. A puppy with attitude is so important. I might even give up something else to get attitude. I start at 4 weeks of age, I get them on a blanket and get down with them and see who interacts with me, who is brave enough to look around. I pick my pup at 8 weeks of age, then my training starts. I do not over train, I think the Miniature Schnauzer is so smart that they get bored with over training. After all conformation is just walking around the ring, standing on a table and baiting. I try to socialize my pups as soon as they have had their vaccinations. I take them to dog shows with me, I have my grandchildren come to visit, and I take them to work with me. Anything I can do to socialize them. When I leash train them I simply want them to walk with me, I don't care where they walk just so they go. Then I will start to ask them to walk on the left and practice stopping and baiting. I try to do this where there are

things that will attract their attention. I try to make time on the table short and rewarding at this age. At the dog shows I walk them around the building at night. Sometimes I can take them in a ring and just play with them. I always take another puppy or adult with them in the ring to give them a distraction from the ring and the confidence to do it. I also put them on the table at the shows to give them the experience of seeing all the commotion. When they are actually entered in a show, no matter what age they are, it is important to let the puppy interact with other things in the ring, not just having to focus on me. If I am lucky they could get looked at and win :-)

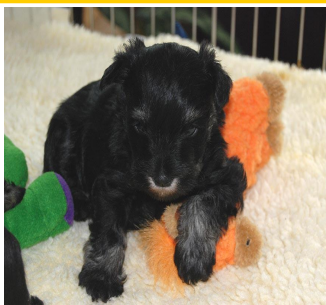

My puppies are raised in the kitchen where they can see and hear many things and get a lot of handling from me and others. I have a pretty good idea of what puppy or puppies I like as soon as they start walking around. The ones that carry themselves well and have a natural stance of course catch my attention. I try not to be too critical until they are 8 weeks old and then each puppy is measured and their structure is evaluated by feeling with my hands and looking at the pups in a mirror while stacked on a table. Of course the pups I like

best stacked must also be as pleasing to me when on the ground standing naturally or moving about. If the litter is a spring litter then they get to go outside and I can see them move the best there. Puppies with any major faults, i.e. too big, too little, bad bite etc., are eliminated right away. I will not keep a puppy with a bad top-line or poor side gait. I will not keep a puppy with a soft temperament either. Even the most beautiful puppy that will not show itself off will not make a good "show" puppy. I pick what I feel are the best two puppies in the litter keeping in mind what I need to improve on in my breeding program and keep those puppies for awhile longer. As they grow many times I decide which of the two puppies is the better dog and keep only that one. I don't want to own more dogs than I think I can devote the time too. My grooming table is just around the corner from my kitchen so these puppies get stacked a lot, have their mouths looked at, are brushed and toenails cut often. They also get treats on the grooming table too. They feel very comfortable on the grooming table at a young age. I think lead breaking little puppies is

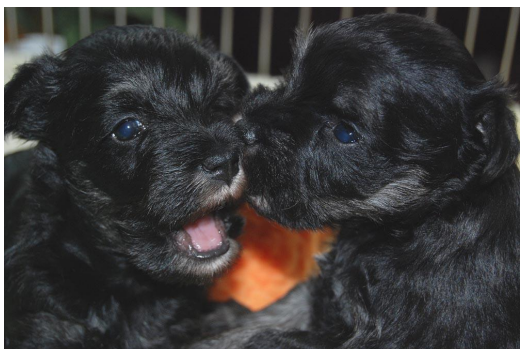

easiest. I usually put a Resco lead on them and encourage them to come with me using food treats. They bounce, run, balk, hop and skip. When they "trot" they are praised and given a treat. When I stop and they stop squarely and look at me I give them a treat. These are always short sessions because I don't want them to get bored with it. When they have at least 2 or 3 vaccinations in them they go with me places, to a dog show, to my mom's house, to an agility trial etc. They are walked on grass, pavement and rubber matting. When they are older like say 5-6 months I take them to a local conformation class a few times. When they can gait and show there pretty well I usually stop taking them because I want them to save some for the real show!

A "pick of the litter" puppy has the same desirable attributes whether it is going to be a conformation prospect or a performance dog. When a breeding is planned the breeder should be aware of the imperfections that need to be eliminated in the coming litter and this should be the reason for doing the breeding. A breeding should be planned with complimenting parents. This means the prospective sire and dam should each have the qualities needed by the other. A line breeding will be more likely to set the good or bad qualities. If you are not familiar with the dogs in the pedigree, find someone that is. A bad front bred to a bad front (even if it is a few generations back) will produce a bad front. There are occasional litters

that have one outstanding puppy that will let you know without a doubt that it is "the one". It will be the one that you watched nurse with its neck arched and tail straight up and wagging. This puppy will be the first one to come across the whelping box to you when it can barely stay up on all fours. It will love to stack and will keep that posture while playing with, and outwitting, the rest of the litter. The choice is easy, but only time will tell if size, teeth and coat will also be correct. What happens if you, or a breeder you are working with, have established a successful line over many generations and know what to expect in the litter? The majority of the litter could have the desirable attributes as a young puppy and will not be as easy to pick out. Now you can look for the puppy that has the qualities that you bred the litter for. A better head, top line, front, rear, coat or shoulders might be some of things you need to improve upon. In this case pick the best two or three puppies and give them time to develop. Find out what this line should measure at eight weeks and four months of age. This will help to sort out the under and oversized puppies. Remember to use your brain not your heart to make these decisions!
