you want to be a part of it. Playing an active part it going. Don't just be a member, be an ACTIVE member!











to them.



My name is Diane Gardner and I live in Mount Morris, Michigan with my 11 year old Miniature Schnauzer named Peppy. I have been a member of MSCM for about 9 years, I believe. I also belong to Companion Dog Training Club of Flint, Canine Combustion Dog Agility Club, DogSports of Genesee County and the American Miniature Schnauzer Club. My activities with my dogs have been performance (obedience and agility) in AKC, UKC, CKC and NADAC. Mostly my dogs have been pets.

My first Miniature Schnauzer was purchased with my mom at a pet store in the mall. I know, not the best way to get a dog. But we had been in there several times to look at the different puppies and nothing ever clicked until we saw Sparky. He came home with us on 4th of July weekend 1989. He had some separation anxiety issues at first but was truly a sweetheart for the short six years I had him. He was supposed to be my mom's dog but she used to tell me he would go upstairs and sleep on my bed most of the day while I was at work. Just about the time I would normally be home he would come downstairs and wait by the door. He helped introduce me to the world of dog obedience training. He earned his AKC CD in 4 tries and earned his AKC Canine Good Citizen title at one of the first events for it held in Michigan. He was a good travel companion, even on long trips, and a lot of our invitations stipulated



Sparky was expected too. My second MS was a puppy I got from Debbie Herrell. Peppy the puppy was an expert at finding any nook and cranny he could to escape from my vard. At some point he finally figured out he wasn't going to have it much better anywhere else and decided to stay in his yard. He is now 11 years old and has settled into a relaxed routine. Although some days you have to be careful he doesn't slip out the door on you because he wants to go for a car ride too. Peppy started obedience as a young puppy and he is pretty game to try anything. He earned his Canadian CD in one weekend. He has agility titles in two different organiza-



tions. Currently he is retired and

enjoying his yard. We had the pleasure of sharing our home for a while with Stephi who was also retired. She tried obedience and agility - what she lacked in skill she made up for in enthusiasm. Both Peppy and Stephi easily passed their CGC tests and went on to become registered therapy dogs with Therapy Dogs International. Stephi died a couple years ago but I still have the neighborhood kids tell me they miss her because she was always available to be petted. Now that I am no longer traveling all over for dog shows, I am in the process of finishing my master's degree in library and information science from Wayne State University. I should be finished by May of 2007. In my spare time I like to read, do cross stitch. I have taken up a running program this summer to train for the 10 mile Crim road race held in Flint each year. Like Stephi what I lack in skill I try to



make up for in enthusiasm. I also try to stay active in the different dog clubs I belong to because I feel that they have helped me gain so much knowledge about my dogs over the years that any help I can provide helps to continue that cycle for others. I work in the Medical Library at McLaren hospital in Flint and frequently have people drop by to ask me a dog-related question. My best advice for anyone starting out with a dog is, sign up for an obedience class and have a good veterinarian and groomer you can talk to. Once they have taken a couple obedience classes it is amazing to see what good companions they become and they enjoy going someplace once a week where they can just talk about their dogs.

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Removing Stains and Odor Recipe

Hydrogen Peroxide Liquid a Ajax dishwashing soap Arm & Hammer Baking soda Empty plastic bottle to put solution in once it is mixed up

Item you will need to find all the old urine spots that have dried but still

smell:

A long slim black light (these are called stink finders in pet stores, and sometimes people sell them on ebay) You probably have these items in your home already, if not they can be purchased at any local store such as Wal-mart or Target, even dollar stores.

Using any plastic container (not metal) mix the solution as follows:

12 oz. 3% hydrogen peroxide

1/2 teaspoon Ajax dishwashing liquid soap

1 1/2 teaspoon A & H baking soda Mix well using a plastic spoon (not metal). If you have a large area or more than one area to clean you may want to use a bigger bowl and mix enough solution according to your needs. Once it is mixed put into your empty plastic bottle. Always discard unused portion because the oxygen in the peroxide mixed with these other items can make it explode, (I found this out the hard way) It had bubbled out all over my countertops one night when I left it setting out. Now on to the fun part. You have to find all the old stains and odors because they give off an odor to your dog or cat that has them coming back to do their business in the same places. I found this works great for me and you don't have to get down on all fours smelling your carpet. If you have a black light shut off all the lights in your home and turn on the black light. The urine in the carpet or on the furniture will glow. I did not believe this until my I tried it and it really works and let me tell you I could not believe at all the urine spots on my carpet. There was places I hadn't even realized my dog could get to. I wanted to just sit down and cry. I was ready to have it all removed and new carpet put down, but I couldn't afford that. No wonder my house didn't smell very good. Once you find the urine spots, then pour the solution evenly on the whole spot, making sure to saturate the carpet and the padding under the carpet (you may want to do a spot test on your carpet or furniture first, but it has never left a stain on anything I have used it on.) Once the whole urine area is saturated block it off to keep people or your pets from walking on it until it is completely dry. Do not blot up any of the formula because the stains need to be saturated thoroughly and then dry on its own. After it has dried, vacuum spot to remove any white powder left over from the baking soda. Scotch guarded carpet takes a while to absorb the liquid, but after it sits there awhile it will absorb into the carpet and padding. You may have to pour a little extra solution on this type of carpet. I found this out because my carpet is scotch guarded but my area rugs are not, and I noticed one was soaking in a lot faster than the other. If your carpets are as bad as mine were, it may

take a few days to clean room by room but it will be well worth it in the end. If you have large areas to clean you can even mix up enough of this to go in a carpet cleaner and clean all spots at once. After I had cleaned every room in the house and the carpets had dried, I noticed my puppy trying to smell out his marked territory but he just kept walking around in circles because his smell was no longer there. That let me know he was ready to go outside and this is how I was able to house break my dog. Now he scratches on the door when he needs to go out. Just remember with older odors saturate really well with the solution and let stand until dry. This solution has worked on both fresh and old odors for me. Now when you walk in my home pet urine IS NOT the first thing you smell. The main ingredient in this is the peroxide because it works the same on the stains as it does on a cut or sore, it brings the urine to the top of the carpet and it is removed by the oxygen molecules. Thanks again and I hope this works for you.

Just an note: if you have a large area to clean then the smell may get worse before it gets better because the solution is pulling all the hidden and old odors to the top of the surface so that they can be dissolved for good.


